In 2020, white nationalist groups organized open rallies calling for racial separation while utilizing social media and the internet to influence and radicalize students towards the cause of white supremacy. This presentation introduces and explains the concepts of white nationalism and white supremacy as well as offering educators the opportunities to identify strategies for engaging with their community before and after an incident of hate or bias.


