MID VALLEY WRAP (WORKING TOWARDS DAY TREATMENT AND RESIDENTIAL)

WRAP is a system of care that identifies professional and natural supports that can "wrap" around families of students with complex needs and multiple symptoms.

Their goal is to develop a team that helps the family advocate for their student.

Goal of participation is improved school achievement and attendance, improvements in behavior and function, success at home or other least restrictive community settings, and to empower parents through community resources.
