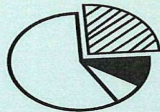

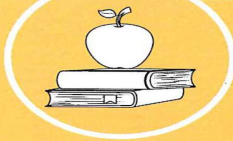
Children under age 13 living in the county <sup>1</sup>

- 1,510 children 0-2 years old <sup>1</sup>
- 1,007 of children 3-4 years old <sup>1</sup>
- 3,356 of children 5-12 years old <sup>1</sup>

Over **1/3** of children are Hispanic or Non-white <sup>2</sup>



Nearly **2/3** of children under age six have both parents employed or a single parent employed <sup>3</sup>

**34%** of a minimum wage worker's annual earnings would be needed to pay the price of child care for a toddler <sup>7</sup>

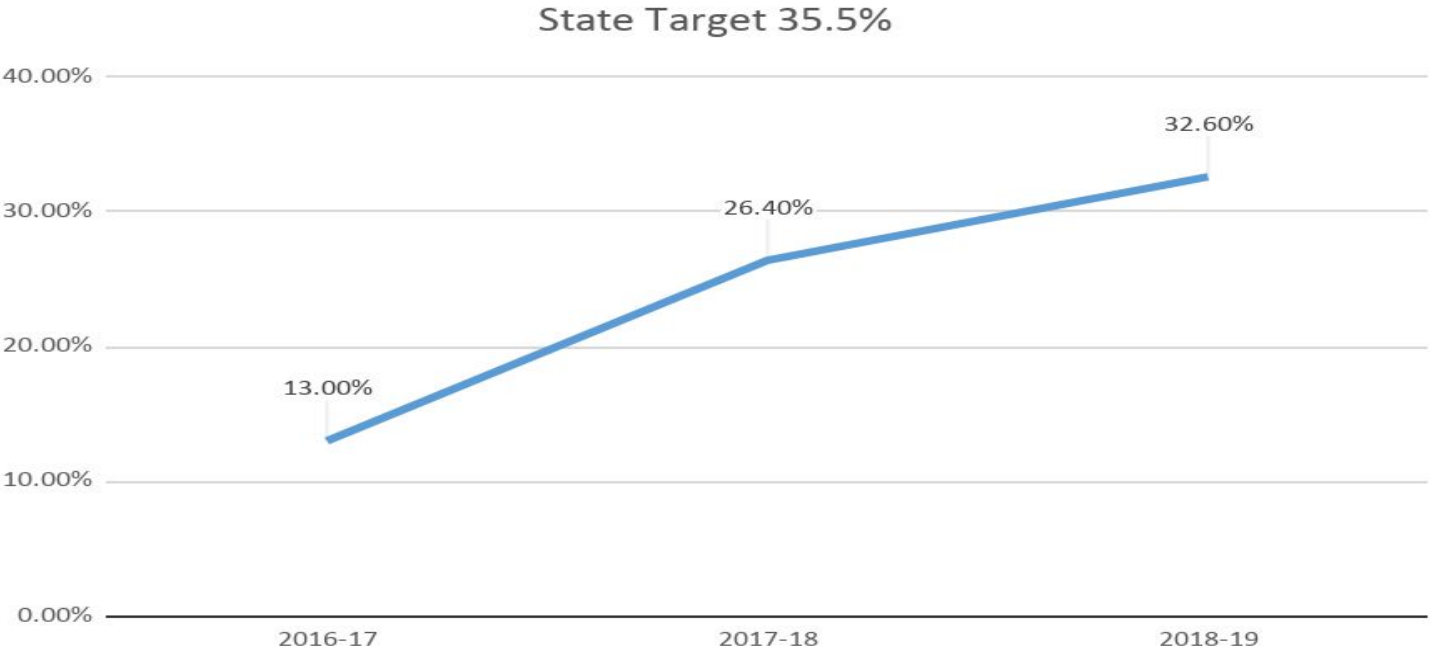


Annual median teacher wages range (median low - median high) <sup>8</sup>

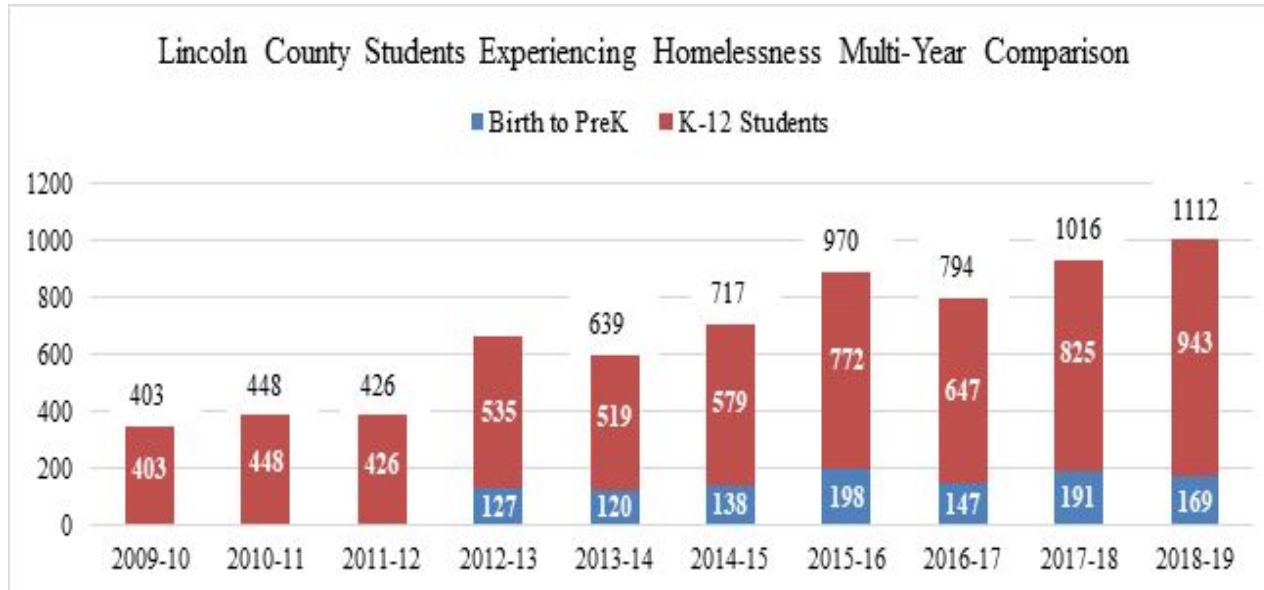

# Homeless data...



Lincoln County has the highest per capita rate of homelessness among children out of all counties in the state (Children First for Oregon, Status of Oregon's Children 2018). During 2018-19, in grades K-12 there were 943 homeless students or 17% of Lincoln County's student population

Overall, 1112 children were identified, 169 homeless children from birth to five years old

# What does the research say...

## Early Education Matters

At-risk children who don't receive a high-quality early childhood education are:

25%

more likely to drop out of school

40%

more likely to become a teen parent

50%

more likely to be placed in special education

60%


more likely to never attend college

70%

more likely to be arrested for a violent crime

# Benefits for preschoolers- Inclusion Model...

ECSE Children	Typical Peers
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Demonstrate higher scores on assessments of language development than children in segregated settings (Strain &amp; Hoyson, 2000).</li><li>• Communication disordered children had comparable language skills to children without disabilities following one year of preschool (Justice et al., 2014).</li><li>• By age 10, students demonstrated a reduced autism severity, increased average IQ, positive ratings of social behaviors by parents, similar levels of social interaction to typically developing peers, and greater participation in general education classes (Rafferty, Piscitelli, &amp; Boettcher, 2003).</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• According to The Early Childhood Research Institute on Inclusion, parents of children without disabilities participating in inclusive programs report positive changes in their children's confidence, self-esteem, and understanding of diversity (ECRII)</li><li>• Children gain opportunities to learn many new skills, values, and attitudes related to human differences, including learning how to be friends with people who are different from themselves and to assist classmates who may be experiencing difficulty (Idol, 2006).</li><li>• Typically developing children make similar developmental gains in regular and inclusive preschools (Odom, DeKlyen, &amp; Jenkins, 1984, Strain and Bovey, 2001).</li></ul>

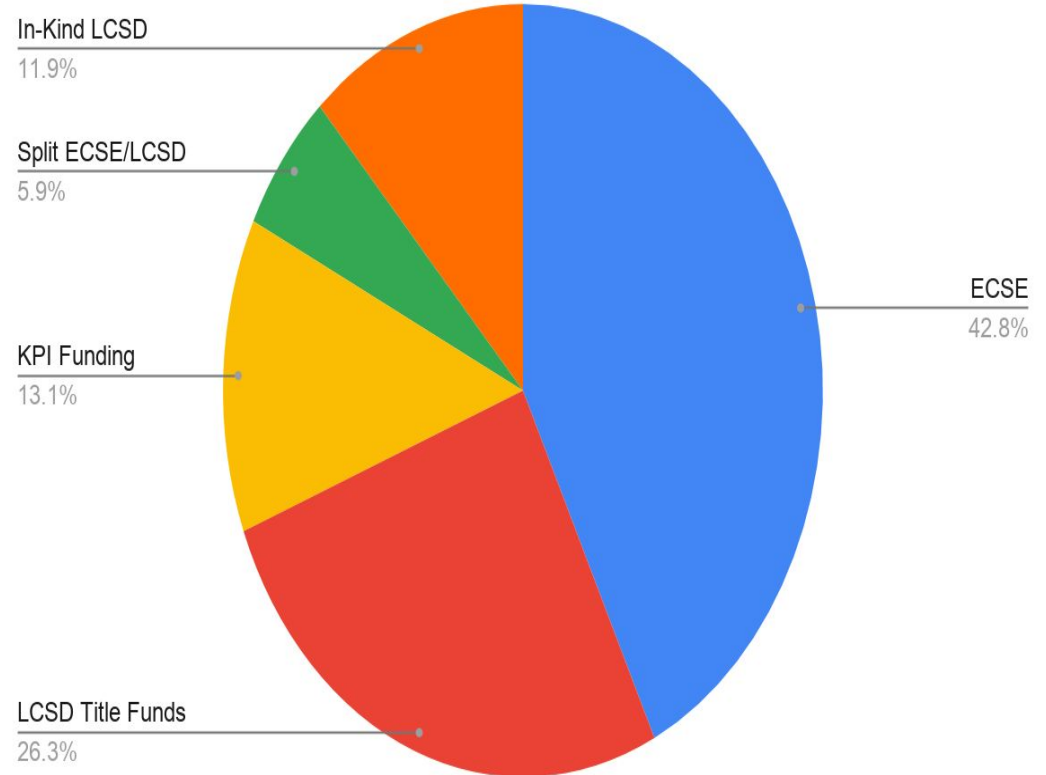

# Program Design...

- Who will be the lead agency?
- Think about pros and cons of each and be intentional about how you want your program to operate.
  - Each agency has their own requirements, be thoughtful about which is the best fit to be the lead.
  - Are you going to be licensed/certified or operate as exempt?
- What will you offer?
  - Half day or full day?
  - How many days per week?
  - Extended hours?

# Program Staffing...

- Shared staffing
- Who supervises the staff?
- Built in time for professional development/collaboration
- Will you use certified staff, classified staff, or both?
  - This will depend on your lead agency's requirements
- Do you have these positions currently or do you need to add them?
  - Union considerations
  - HR involvement

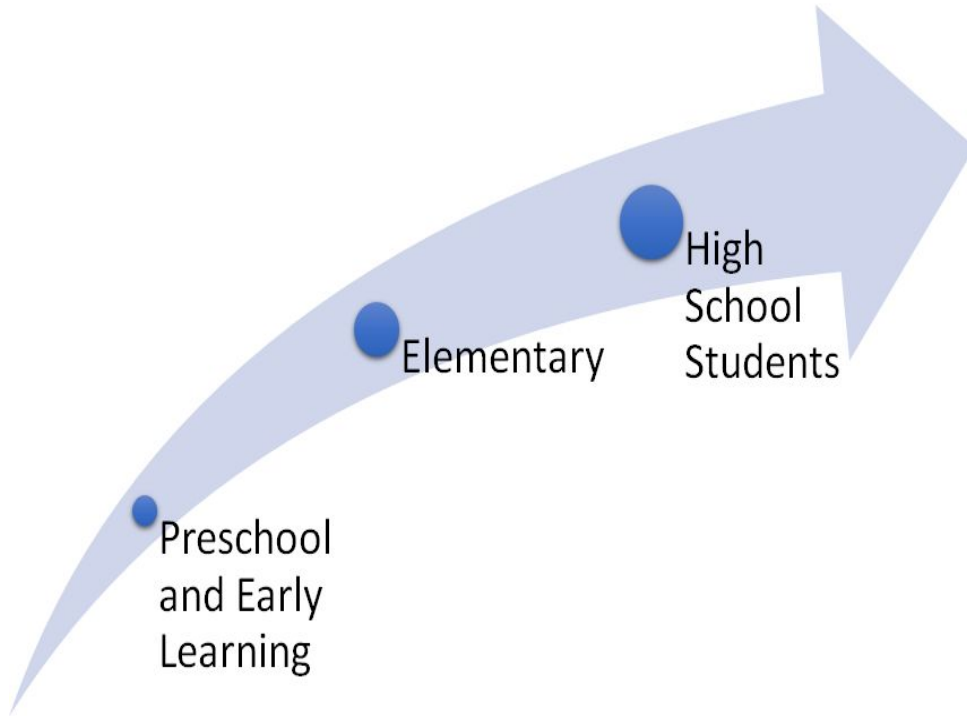
