\$7.875 Billion Improvement Trajectory

Funding at the \$7.875b level enables North Wasco to participate in the economic recovery that is occurring in Oregon. Funding at this level sends a clear message that success at K-12 schools is essential in continuing this recovery.

- An increase of \$255 per ADMw from 2014-15 funding level
- Return to pre-recession (2008) class sizes
- Increase CTE course offerings
- Provide the technology to support curriculum, instruction and assessment
- Adequately funds the implementation of full- day kindergarten
- Begin to address deferred maintenance needs

\$7.875b is a basic funding level. According to the Quality Education Commission \$9.2b is the investment needed for Oregon schools to
