The Sheridan School District will receive \$59 fewer dollars per student next year than we received this year. This is \$79,000 less in revenue coming into the district and would mean 1 less teacher.

We need to update curriculum for our students and are hoping to update our STEM facilities and better prepare our students for careers after high school, but this level will not allow those updates. This funding level does not allow us to add an early childhood education initiative that our community desperately needs. This level of funding will continue the slow decay of our educational system as districts such as

Sheridan struggle to maintain educational programs that serve the community well.
