What's an ESD?

- Education Service District
- 19 across the state (ORS 334.013)
- 9 defined by county lines-Multnomah, Lane, Douglas, Lake, Clackamas, Wallowa, Harney, Grant, Jefferson



Primary Mission of ESDs

The mission of education service districts is to assist school districts and the Department of Education in achieving Oregon's educational goals by providing equitable, high quality, costeffective and locally responsive educational services at a regional level

~ORS 334.005

History of Regional Services in Oregon

1872-1944



County Unit in charge

of curriculum, textbooks, facilities, teachers and distribution of funds.

1945-1962

Rural School Districts: (less than 1000 students)

- Equalization of operating costs
- Focus on special education services

1963-1976 "intermediate education districts" (IEDs)

- Library
- · Curriculum materials
- · Central purchasing
- · Special teachers
- Special education services

1963 – Intermediate Education Districts

- Levying of property taxes returned to local districts
- IED retained previous tax base
- · Resolution process established

1977

Name changed to "education service districts" (ESDs)

• Significant focus on special education

ESD – <u>Similarities</u> with local school districts

- · Required to have a board of directors
- · Compliance with public meeting laws
- · Required to have adopted policies
- Required to hire a superintendent
- · Required to follow Oregon Budget Law
- Part of state school fund

ESD – <u>Differences</u> with local school districts

- Home School Registration
- May provide entrepreneurial services and facilities to public and private entities
- Annual report of the performance and the finances of the ESD service for the previous school year
- Budget Committee members appointed by local hoards
- · Chair may serve only two years in succession

ESD Funding

1997 – Passage of Ballot Measures 47 & 50 converted ESD tax bases to "rates"

2001

- 5 % of State School Fund (SSF) now 4.5%
- · Equalization across the state
- · 90 percent of SSF revenue spent on services

ESD Funding

2016-17

- Local Revenue \$118 million
- SSF \$120 million
- Average per student per ESD \$333

- •Children with special needs
- Technology support
- School improvement
- •Administrative support

2005 - Local Service Plans

Resolution Services

- Approved by the Boards of two-thirds of local districts with over 50 percent of the students
- · Approval by March 1
- •<u>90 %</u> of general fund (property taxes and state school fund) must go to Resolution Services

2013 - ORS 334.015

- Local Districts may withdraw ("opt-out") from their ESD with enrollment-based revenue (state school fund) paid to the districts.
- Requires an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the school district board.
- The school districts no longer be part of the ESD or receive ESD services unless provided for by contract.
- Such districts would no longer be part of the local service plan approval process.
