

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
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#### **SALISHAN RESORT MAP**

#### Bill Daggett, Founder/Chairman, International Center for Leadership in Education

Dr. Bill Daggett is Founder and Chairman of the International Center for Leadership in Education, Inc. He is known worldwide for his efforts to move preK-12 education systems towards more rigorous and relevant skills and knowledge for all students. Dr. Daggett has assisted states, school districts, and education ministries in other countries with their school reform initiatives. He is the creator of the Rigor/Relevance Framework, a practical planning and instructional tool that is used in schools throughout the United States. Dr. Daggett helps people look at education differently. He encourages his audiences to embrace what is best about our education system and to make the changes necessary to meet the needs of all students.



#### Daniel King, Superintendent of Schools, Pharr-San Juan-Alamo Independent SD, TX

A public school superintendent for the last 17 years, Dr. Daniel P. King was recently named the 2013 Texas Superintendent of the Year by the American Association of School Administrators and was the 2006 Superintendent of the Year for the Texas Association of School Boards. Since July of 2007, he has led the Pharr-San Juan-Alamo Independent School District (PSJA). Under his leadership, PSJA has made tremendous progress on some of the most significant challenges that face Texas and the nation. Dr. King has committed to replacing outdated bilingual education models with a dual language or dual immersion program, with the goal of developing college ready bi-literacy.



#### Sandy Husk, Chief Executive Officer, AVID Center

Dr. Sandy Husk joined AVID Center as Chief Executive Officer in January 2014, bringing more than 17 years of experience implementing AVID in the three districts where she has served as superintendent, most recently in Salem-Keizer, Oregon, the second largest district in that state. ### **Expanding Dual Enrollment & Early College High School: A Powerful Strategy For Increasing College Success**

Keynote: Daniel King, Superintendent of Schools, Pharr-San Juan-Alamo Independent SD, TX

A border school district serving more than 32,000 students (99% Hispanic and 89% economically disadvantaged), PSJA ISD had a dropout rate more than double the state average. Under Dr. King's leadership, the number of annual dropouts has been cut dramatically, and the dropout rate is now less than half the state rate. The number of annual high school graduates has doubled and the four-year

graduation rate has increased from 62.4% to 90.1% during, surpassing the state average. PSJA has become a state and national model for dropout prevention and recovery, inspiring state legislation (SB 975) and replication of its innovative initiatives across Texas and the nation.

PSJA has undertaken an even bolder initiative College³ (All students: Ready.Connected. Complete.™) Initiating and scaling up a network of Early College High Schools, concurrent and dual enrollment opportunities, and college and career connected career pathways, PSJA is determined to offer every single student the opportunity to earn at least 12 college hours by high school graduation, with many earning more - up to an Associate's Degree. This ambitious plan has many PSJA graduates completing their Bachelor's Degrees in as little as two years after their high school graduation. Over the last few years, hundreds of PSJA students have received an Associate Degree or College Certificate prior to their high school graduation.
