Patrick Clarke Named OSSA 2025 Teacher of the Year



The Oregon Small Schools Association (OSSA) is pleased to announce that Patrick Clarke, a teacher at Siletz Valley Charter School in Lincoln County, has been named the 2025 Teacher of the Year. Clarke's unique approach to education, blending his experiences as an army cook with a passion for teaching cultural traditions through food, has had a lasting impact on his students and community.

Clarke has transformed a simple food service program into a comprehensive culinary curriculum that teaches students to grow, harvest, prepare, and serve a variety of foods, all while celebrating the cultural significance of food. Ginger Redlinger, Superintendent/Principal of Siletz Valley Schools, praised Clarke's work, saying, "Patrick has a vision that addresses the needs of everyone, from children to elders, understanding

that good food brings families together."

His work in the Siletz tribal community has earned him the respect of local tribal members, who have invited him to share his expertise in preparing food for ceremonial events. As Redlinger highlighted, Clarke's program goes beyond cooking; it connects students with their cultural heritage and fosters a deeper appreciation for food as a cultural gift.

"I am humbled and honored to receive this award," said Clarke. "I am surrounded by incredible colleagues and students who inspire me every day to be my best."

Clarke's dedication to his students, community, and cultural heritage exemplifies the values OSSA seeks in its Teacher of the Year. The award recognizes educators who demonstrate integrity, leadership, commitment to community, scholarship, and student achievement.

Clarke was honored with the Teacher of the Year award at the OSSA Spring Conference, held on April 18, 2025, at the Salishan Resort.

She has transformed the school into a place where students are excited to learn and parents trust that their children are thriving in a safe and nurturing environment.
