

## FEATURED SPEAKERS



Melanie Berry, Research Associate, Fisher Stress Neurobiology and Prevention Laboratory, University of Oregon and the Oregon Social Learning Center

Dr. Melanie Berry obtained her doctoral degree in clinical psychology at the PGSP-Stanford Psy.D. Consortium. Her area of focus is serving high-risk children and parents, particularly families who are involved with the child welfare system. Currently, Dr. Berry is a research associate at Fisher Stress Neurobiology and Prevention (SNAP) laboratory at the University of Oregon and the Oregon Social Learning Center. At the SNAP lab, Dr. Berry is a core member of the team that has developed the Filming Interaction to Nurture Development (FIND) program, an innovative video coaching program for parents and other caregivers of high-risk children. As a FIND consultant, Dr. Berry provides training and consultation to FIND teams across the country. Connected to her work with FIND, she is also involved with Frontiers of Innovation at the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, an initiative to promote positive outcomes for vulnerable children.



#### **Colt Gill, Chief Education Innovation Officer**

Colt was appointed by Governor Brown as Oregon's first Education Innovation Officer. In this position he will focus on improving graduation outcomes by working with local communities, school districts, researchers, students, and other stakeholders to identify effective practices across the P-20 continuum and make recommendations to the Governor, state agencies, and the Legislature regarding policies, budget priorities and supports needed to increase the number of students who graduate prepared for their next steps in the work place or college. He has been an Oregon educator for 27 years. He is an adjunct professor at the University of Oregon and has served on a number of boards and commissions for the both the State of Oregon and various education and children's health and wellness institutions.



#### David Mandell, Interim Early Learning System Director

David has been active in early childhood policy in Oregon for close to a decade. He spent seven years as the Policy & Research Director of the Children's Institute, where he focused on such topics as early childhood professional development, kindergarten assessment, and integrating social-emotional development into early childhood services. Mr. Mandell received his Ph.D. in political science from the University of Chicago and most recently served as the Special Advisor on Early Childhood to Oregon Speaker of the House Tina Kotek.



#### Alisha Moreland-Capuia, Executive Director, Avel Gordly Center for Healing at OHSU

A native Oregonian, Dr. Alisha Moreland-Capuia is a physician, scholar, educator and orator. Her thought leadership mobilizes our community to respond to critical social needs of the day. The newly appointed chief medical director for Volunteers of America (VOA) Oregon, a local branch of the national organization that provides social services throughout the U.S., Dr. Moreland-Capuia is a rising star with a fierce commitment to compassionate and intelligent leadership.

With deep roots in and a steadfast commitment to serve the community she comes from, Dr. Moreland-Capuia holds several distinct honors, among them being the first African-American native Oregonian to become a licensed and board-certified psychiatrist. Frequently tapped to advise on matters of medicine, public health and education, she serves on several boards and is a former appointee to the Governor's Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Programs. An acclaimed leader and speaker, Dr. Moreland-Capuia lists her greatest accomplishment as that of being a wife and mother.

Paramount to developing successful readers and writers is the understanding that reading and writing are based on communication, language, and thinking. Children do not learn to read in first grade, instead they spend their first five years developing the skills and acquiring the knowledge that make first grade reading an attainable goal. Similarly, third grade is not the time when children learn to write comprehensive narratives that exceed national standards. In fact, children's development of narrative begins before they are two years old. Becoming successful readers, writers, thinkers, and speakers starts at birth and continues through elementary school. This session introduces Washington's Early Literacy Pathway document. A birth through third grade developmental Literacy Continuum based on guiding Washington state standards and frameworks (*The Washington Early Learning and Development Guidelines, Teaching Strategies Gold, The Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework, and The Common Core State Standards*).

This interactive presentation will explore the roots of challenging behaviors by describing the latest research on the neuroscience of brain development including typical social emotional development and the adverse impact of trauma in early childhood. Challenging behaviors will be re-framed as maladaptive behaviors stemming from adaptation to environments that the young child previously experienced. Applying the science of brain development, strategies for supporting repair of maladaptive behaviors will be outlined. Also, suggestions for creation of an environment in the workplace that is trauma-informed, sensitive, respectful and welcoming of children from all cultures, their families and staff will be introduced.

Many educators find themselves in diverse classrooms today. As research mounts about the importance of Early Childhood Education to the development of social emotional skills, many Elementary Schools are opening preschool classrooms within their buildings and in doing so are bringing SW PBIS into these classrooms. Although much of PBIS, whether in K-12 systems or preschool classrooms are similar there are critical differences in implementation. In this session we will outline similarities and differences between Schoolwide PBIS systems and Pyramid Model Practices in Early Childhood. We will also share 3 tools to assess and evaluate PBIS implementation within preschool classrooms and support staff development and training.


