INDIGENOUS RECOGNITION STATEMENT

The University of Oregon is located on Kalapuya Ilihi, the traditional indigenous homeland of the Kalapuya people. Today, descendants are citizens of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde Community of Oregon and the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians of Oregon, and they continue to make important contributions in their communities, at UO, and across the land we now refer to as Oregon.

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DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to provide K-12 school administrators with up-to-date information on legal and financial issues critical to Oregon schools. Students consist mainly of (a) licensed Oregon school administrators and other school personnel who want to earn graduate credit, while updating their knowledge of Oregon school law and finance; (b) out-of-state certified administrators who are applying for an Oregon Administrator License; and (c) licensed Oregon elementary and secondary teachers considering a career in school administration.

OBJECTIVES

In this course, you will:

- Understand the relationship between local, state and federal funding as it pertains to K-12 schools in Oregon.
- Understand and be able to describe the key elements of Oregon's K-12 State School Fund (SSF) formula including the weighted factors in ADMw.
- Understand the Student Success Act and how the Student Investment Account (SIA) supports the district's budget.
- Identify Oregon law that guides the K-12 budget process and be able to describe the various steps in a budget process from the proposed budget to the adopted budget.
- Understand best practices and strategies for how to train, prepare and facilitate the budget committee.

- Identify school district policies that impact the budget process and understand the components of the policy that guide equitable resource allocation throughout the district.
- Understand the importance and best practices for creating data tracking systems that routinely inform and project future budgets.
- Understand the key components to an effective Budget Message including the development of a draft budget message for their district.
- Understand a variety of strategies for managing reserve accounts, special revenue funds and ending fund balances.

Oregon School Law

- Understand and apply Federal and Oregon education law as it pertains to the role of K-12 School Administrators.
- Show a foundational understanding of Civil Rights law as it pertains to students, families, and staff.
- Identify the roles and responsibilities of Oregon School Administrators in ensuring access to educational programs.
- Understand IDEA and Section 504 and their intersectionality, and the role and responsibilities of Oregon School Administrators in implementing IDEA and 504 in schools.
- Understand and correctly administer School Board Policies and the accompanying Administrative Rules.
- Identify and understand the liability risk of Oregon School Administrators.
- Demonstrate an understanding of ethics laws and the ethical responsibilities of Oregon School Administrators in the performance of their duties.
- Demonstrate knowledge of current hot topics that have legal implications for schools and school districts.

TEXTBOOKS & READING MATERIALS

Materials will be distributed during class and students will be reviewing Board Policies, Collective Bargaining Agreements, and various websites.

COURSE STRUCTURE

This class is taught synchronously. Participants will be expected to participate throughout the two days in breakout sessions, etc. If you are unable to attend all hours of the two days, you will be unable to pass this course. Consider taking this seminar during fall term at the COSA Law Conference if you have other commitments during the two days.

QUIZZES, EXAMS and ASSIGNMENTS

There are no quizzes or exams scheduled for this course. Discussion Board and other assignments including a final assignment for both the Finance and Law portion of class are required.

GRADING POLICY

This class is graded as Pass / No Pass. Your final grade for this course will be based upon successful completion of all assignments with a minimum of a "B" and full participation. **Final grades will be issued at the end of** *summer term*.
