More effective community services


Parent and Family Engagement


- Participation vs. Involvement
- Instilled through ways other than traditional school-related ones
- Level of participation or involvement in programs and services and there are specific outcomes as a result
- How parents feel about and understand services and relationships

IT IS NOT ONE SIZE FITS ALL

Why is family engagement important?

- Effects of family involvement on math outcomes = math knowledge and skills increase
- Involvement in school activities can predict literacy and math skills as well as teachers' report of academic progress
- Parent-initiated school involvement at key developmental transitions have a positive effect on academic outcomes

Culturally Responsive Standards-Based Teaching


- What evidence have you seen in the classroom?
- Culturally relevant books are included in the classroom library
- Family and community members are invited to speak as guests
- Walls are covered with
 - pictures of students and/or people who are important to the students
 - student work
 - quotes from students, family and community members or famous people who represent the cultures of the students
 - signs in multiple languages

Cultural Responsiveness

- Valuing Diversity
- Having capacity for cultural self-assessment
- Being conscious of the dynamics inherent when cultures interact
- Embedding cultural diversity and responsiveness into all aspects of the school or classroom
- Implementing different interactions and behaviors in response to cultural diversity

Benefits

Parents

- Feel valued and respected
- Are more involved in children's learning and development
- Feel family practices and beliefs are understood and valued
- Feel comfortable visiting the school and talking with teachers
- Understand more about their children's experience at school
- Understand why early childhood and K-12 education is important
- Have increased confidence in their own parenting skills

Staff

- Understand more about their students' lives and utilize that information when planning and teaching
- Learn and use parent skills and expertise
- Can provide a more supportive environment for students
- Learn and use less "traditional" methods to communicate

Benefits for Students

- Feel more secure and confident at school
- Transition from one setting to another with more confidence
- Enjoy learning more when connected to home
